Gentlemen

Having examined the line of Country betwixt ese two Towns for the purpose of making a Railway I have only nsidered the nature of the work required for the construction of Railway on the route I have stated, and I am satisfied that 000 per mile will be sufficient for a single line including land d stations. I am supposing the land to cost £150 per acre (that is e average), and 7 acres per mile: but to be quite safe we will say 000 per mile. For the latter sum I would guarantee the construction the line crossing the river five times with good substantial oden Bridges and proper Station houses where required. Supposing the ne to beline to be eight miles long at £8000 per mile which will ount to £64,000.

From the favourable nature of the gradients I feel ite justified that the line can be worked for about 33 per cent of e gross income.

Having now given you the sum required to make the ne, and also the sum required to work the line, these two statements ll enable you to judge whether a traffic case can be made out to pay fair per-centage on the outlay. My own opinion is that it will be safe and profitable investiment; but before any thing more is done, should recommend that a Statement of traffic be made out by some reful person.

can collect from other railway Acts the charges of different cicles per mile, when this part of the business has been gone rough you will be able to form a pretty correct judgement as to merit of the scheme.
